"From early on we both had strong work ethics, and we took our work very seriously, so although Michael's job as a private general manager is demanding, we always took the time that we did



Because of the multifaceted nature of the club business, a traditional family approach cannot successfully be incorporated into the equation.

"Spending quality time as a family is essential in achieving this goal, especially during the holidays. Support, even if there's not a specific support network, among spouses of general managers is beneficial. To wit:

"While my husband was a child to a private club general manager, there was definitely a void in this area," Cheri DiPietro suggested.

"Today, with so many young families entering the club industry change was necessary. The leadership of the Florida Chapter Club Managers Association of America developed programs where our husbands can participate in continued education while balancing quality time with their own and other club manager families. These programs have transcended into strong family networks and some of our best friends have become a direct result of the same."

It's a point Irene McCarthy stresses. "There is a great network in the Florida Chapter of the CMAA. They do an amazing job of including spouses and children in the CMAA events.

"The kids actually have a great network as well – a positive thing about the Florida Chapter - spouses and kids - they do a great job," Irene explained.

"Our daughters, Molly and Emma were just three and one years old when we moved to Florida and they have grown up with the other kids. It's great to the cycle that takes place. For example, just recently at an event in Amelia Island, our daughters, who were once babysat by older children, are now babysitting for some of the younger children.

"Each region of CMAA usually has a strength within and the wives are a part of that strength," commented Sharon DiPietro.

"Again, I am fortunate - the Seminole Region is a wonderful group of professionals that consider the group to be extended family and wonderful friends. We not only share time with one another at CMAA events, we choose to make time for our families to get together just to be together.

"If, at that time, someone wishes to talk about difficulties or share other things, someone is also there as support or to give advise – we do so as friends not as a 'support group."

And these spouses do have some advice for newcomers to the private club industry!

Irene McCarthy: You can't let the demands of the business lead your life - you make adjustments and make the time you have together something special.
